



Dear Lakeview Family,

I am sure many of you are like me in that at the end of every year and the beginning of every New Year, I get quite reflective on how fast time goes and so resonate more and more each year with such truths as Psalm 144:4 *Man is like a breath; his days are like a passing shadow.*

So the inevitable question arises for me, "Am I making the best use of my time?" And this question always leads me back to a couple of texts to consider: Psalm 90:12 and Ephesians 5:15-16.

As for the Psalm 90:12 text, no one impacted me more in the application of this than a former church member of mine, Dan Williams. Weeks before his death, Dan asked me to preach his funeral and he handed me his spiritual journal that he had told me about on several occasions.

As to the relevance of this journal, the day Dan turned fifty, he was reading Psalm 90. He was already feeling how fast time was going so Psalm 90 uniquely impacted him on his fiftieth. He read 90:10 *the years of our life are 70, or even by reason of strength 80...*¹² *so teach us to number our days that we may get a heart of wisdom.*

So on his fiftieth birthday, he reasoned that the psalm is saying, generally speaking, the years of our lives are around 70-80. He said, "I'm 50. That means, I have got twenty years left based on this generality and the psalmist is calling us to number our days so that we might live wisely."

So he took a calculator, and he multiplied 20 (years) x 365 (days), which totaled 7300. So Dan started a spiritual journal. Day 1, 7300 days left. Day 2, 7299 and so on and this discipline kept him mindful to live wisely. With the countdown on, he didn't want to waste a single day. I read excerpts from his journal at his funeral. Each day was filled with spiritual disciplines, Great Commandment and Great Commission pursuits. He only lived to be 67, but anyone who knew him would tell you, he redeemed his time and it impacted everyone.

I think the Apostle Paul would have agreed that Dan's approach to life is a wise application of Paul's words in Ephesians 5:15 *Look carefully then how you walk, not as unwise but as wise,* ¹⁶ *making the best use of the time, because the days are evil.*

As we begin 2022, let me offer you some practical ways on how to make the best use of your time: (1) <u>It starts corporately</u>: ensure that church life is the center of your family's gravity. It is not just a box to check. Your kids will see that for what it is. (2) <u>Regular family devotions</u>: Open your Bible and pray as a family. Pray for the church roll and for our corporate gatherings so that your children can hear how crucial those gatherings and the church are. Sing songs together. A good place to start would be to get your family a good hymn book, like the Grace Hymnal; (3) <u>Identify an unbeliever</u> in your sphere of influence who needs the gospel and invest in that relationship. (4) <u>Identify a young believer</u> in your sphere of influence and invest. (5) <u>Identity a more mature believer</u> who will invest in you. (6) <u>Read through a Bible reading plan</u>. Pray and memorize the Scriptures (7) <u>Have scheduled time with your spouse and family</u> where you set aside your phone and have them set aside theirs as well. (9) <u>Enjoy leisure activities</u> for the purpose of regrouping; but have a time budget. Binging leisure is not redeeming the time. (10) <u>Budget time to read Christian books</u>: Sit at the feet of Christian authors who have been called and gifted to teach and write spiritually edifying books.

Indeed, the Apostle Paul says that wise people redeem their time. The reformer Philipp Melanchthon got this. He kept note of every wasted moment and brought his list to the LORD in confession at the end of each day.

Somebody once advertised as follows: *Lost, yesterday, somewhere between sunrise and sunset, two golden hours, each set with sixty diamond minutes. No reward offered, for they are gone forever.* This concern drove Jonathan Edwards to make his 70th *Resolution* just before his twentieth birthday: *Resolved: Never to lose one moment of time, but to improve it in the most profitable way I possibly can.*

May that, by God's grace, be our heart's cry this year.
