Dear Lakeview Family,

On Monday, February 5th, we will once again have our children's catechism class. This is a ministry that was started by Brother Al many years ago that has had an impact on many through the years.

Historically, the ministry of grounding new believers in the essentials of Christianity has been known as catechesis. It really flourished between the second and fifth centuries in the early church.

Unfortunately, during the Dark Ages, the ministry of catechesis largely floundered for much of the next one thousand years. The line between natural and spiritual birth all but disappeared as in the West, the line between the church and the state also vanished. Consequently, untold numbers of persons who claimed to belong to Jesus had very little idea of what they actually meant.

The Reformers (Luther, Calvin, etc.) sought to change that. Luther restored the office of catechist (a teacher; the one who catechizes others) to the churches. Providentially, the printing press, which had been invented just decades before their time, allowed Luther, Calvin, and others to print and distribute catechisms. These were small handbooks, used to instruct children and others, who were interested in the essentials of the Christian faith. Catechisms of greater depth were produced for Christian adults and leaders. Moreover, entire congregations were instructed through catechetical preaching, regular catechizing of children in Sunday worship, and in many cases, through the renewed practice of congregational singing of psalms and hymns.

The deep-seated conviction of the Reformers that such catechetical work must be primary is very apparent. Just consider the words of John Calvin as he wrote in 1548 to the Lord Protector of England, "Believe me, Monseigneur, the Church of God will never be preserved without catechesis." Many Protestant leaders understood this. Richard Baxter, John Own, Charles Spurgeon, and countless other pastors and leaders saw catechesis as one of their most obvious and basic pastoral responsibilities. If they could not wholeheartedly embrace and utilize an existing catechism for such instruction, they would adapt or edit one or would simply write their own.

Of course, the Church of Rome, responding to the growing influence of the Protestant catechisms, soon began to produce its own to counter the spread of Protestant, evangelical theology. Unfortunately, for many in the Western church today, when they hear catechism, they think Roman Catholicism.

Historically, it was the Protestant Reformation that was behind the revival of catechizing. The Roman Catholics just followed suit. Unfortunately, while the Catholic Church has renewed its catechetical labors with vigor, most evangelical churches have not likewise returned to their own catechetical roots. Because of a variety of reasons like subtle liberalism, revivalism, or pragmatism, for most contemporary evangelicals the entire idea of catechesis is largely a foreign concept.

In a 2009 article titled, "The Coming Evangelical Collapse," Michael Spencer warns, "We Evangelicals have failed to pass on to our young people an orthodox form of faith that can take root and survive the secular onslaught. Ironically, the billions of dollars we've spent on youth ministers, Christian music, publishing, and media has produced a culture of young Christians who known next to nothing about their own faith except how they should feel about it. Our young people have deep beliefs about the culture war, but do not know why they should obey Scripture, the essentials of theology, or the experience of spiritual discipline and community. Coming generations of Christians are going to be monumentally ignorant and unprepared for culture-wide pressures."

In the summer of 1979, Brother Al was convicted to do something about this trend. I am glad he did; and so are countless families whose children have been catechized under Brother Al's teaching.

So we continue to offer this Lakeview ministry to our children, ages first grade to 6th grade. The class will be from 4:00-5:00 and will be offered every Monday in February (the 5th, 12th, 19th, and 26th). Our goal is to equip and prepare our young people to be arrows that we send out into the world, armed with the faith once for all delivered to the saints (Jude 3).

One last thing. Men, if you can make it, I encourage you to attend our Iron Sharpens Iron night on February 8th. The evening will feature Wes King and his sons. Tickets are going fast so make sure you do not wait too late to secure yours. Every man needs time with other men, centered on the Word of God. You need it, I need it and our boys need it. I hope you can make it.

How long have you been on staff at Lakeview Baptist Church? I have been on staff at Lakeview Baptist Church for 4 years.

Tell us about your family in 2 to 3 sentences?

I am married to my wonderful wife, named Betty. We have been married for 40 years and have 4 grown children, and 9 precious grandchildren.

What is an average work week look like for you?

The question makes me smile because there is no average work week. The obvious beginning of the day is to start with a good quiet time in the Word and prayer. What I do right before I go to sleep

is so important. I usually listen to the Scripture on my phone. My goal is to read all the Bible in a year and read through the Psalms and Proverbs each month. Mondays and Tuesdays are quite busy, usually with our food pantry and many people coming in the office door asking for help. We listen to their needs and share the gospel. When we think appropriate, we help them with their bills or give them an emergency food bag. I oversee a theology group that meets early Wednesday mornings and co-teach a young married class on Sundays. So, there is some preparation and study time associated with these ministries. I also oversee a portion of our prayer ministry attempting to keep the prayer sheet updated. We have a monthly men's luncheon where I interview one of our leaders and enjoy fellowship with our men. I organize and oversee Sunday School ministries to Monarch and Auburn Assisted Living. After getting the ministries started, as well as a few other Bible studies, it has been a blessing to see our men teach and care for those in these assisted living places. If we have a funeral, I oversee the process with the help of many, sometimes doing the eulogy. Betty and I do some pre-marital counseling and I perform some weddings. There is also hospital and home visitation to be done which is shared by deacons. staff, and some trained chaplains. I counsel some on the phone and in person and pray for many. I love our Senior Saints and teach a Seminary class at Christ Redeemer Seminary in town. And very importantly, I am so blessed to have Haley Wine and other secretaries to help me carry on these ministries. Thank you, Haley and all.

What Bible verse has been encouraging to you lately?

The combination of two verses stays on my heart daily. "If we confess our sins, he is faithful and just to forgive us our sins and to cleanse us from all unrighteousness" (1 John 1:9). The emphasis is that I confess, and God is faithful. I have confidence to move on from my sin, because God is faithful to forgive and cleanse. And because I desperately need His indwelling power, I cling to the promise of Ephesians 5:18. "And do not get drunk with wine, for that is debauchery, but be filled with the Spirit," (Ephesians 5:18). God's commands are our promises because we know that His commands are His will for us (1 John 5:14). My life verse is: "As a deer pants for flowing streams, so pants my soul for you, O God." (Psalm 42:1, ESV)


