



Dear Lakeview Family,

Unless I am mistaken, the last movie I attended in the theater was the 2017 film, "The Greatest Showman." In that movie, there is a stirring song called, "Never Enough." It sometimes concerns me that I provoke you to break into "Never Enough" when I remind you of offerings like the Annie Armstrong Easter Offering (AAEA), especially with it coming so close off the heels of the Lottie Moon Christian Offering.

I certainly do not want you to feel that way. The fact is, a relatively large percentage of Lakeview members are faithful and sacrificial when it comes to giving to missions' offerings like the AAEA. But the fact is, it can sometimes feel that given the need to preach the gospel in North America (and beyond), the financial burden to pull this off seems unreachable.

So how can my individual contribution to the AAEO even make a dent in what is needed? After all, our North American Mission Board (NAMB) has to support more than 2,900 missionary families serving across the United States and Canada. What good can my small pittance do?

But I want you to think of it this way. All of us are simply role players. It is no individual's (or church's) responsibility to carry the entire burden of NAMB. To help you process that, I think the parable Jesus told of the talents is helpful here.

Jesus told the story of a man who entrusted his servants with his property when he went on a journey (Matthew 25:14-30). The master gave to one servant five talents, to another, two talents, and to the third, one talent (which were monetary units). After a time, the master returned and settled accounts with the three servants. The first servant made five talents in addition to the five he entrusted to him. The second servant, likewise, made two talents. But the third servant, fearing that his master was over demanding, buried his talent in the ground so that at least he would not lose what he had been given. To the first two servants, the master pronounced, "Well done, good and faithful servant" (25:21, 23), but the third servant heard he was a "wicked and slothful servant" (25:26).

Let me offer you three points drawn from this parable that I think can encourage you here (with help from Kevin DeYoung's book, *Impossible Christianity*, pg. 13-15). First, this parable is about how God will assess us at the end of the age (25:13). "Well done" is what ordinary, faithful stewards will hear.

Second, the two good servants were commended for being faithful with what they had been given. They did not change the world. They were simply faithful with what was entrusted to them. In fact, the second servant's investment yielded only forty percent of what the first servant yielded. Yet they both received the same commendation. Neither one was held accountable to do what they could not do. Just be faithful with the opportunities they had.

Third and finally, the last servant was deemed unfaithful because he thought his master was impossible to please. This made him lazy and a poor steward. (Pastor's Pen continued on next page)

When we think our responsibility is impossible, we generally do not do more for Christ; we do far less.

Let us remember this parable as we complete AAEO season. Currently, the Lakeview family has given \$67,801 to the AAEO. Just as a reference point, last year \$100,782 was given. No individual or individual church, for that matter, can move the needle on meeting the vast needs in North American missions' efforts, but we can sure steward what God has entrusted to us. And that will be enough!
