Dear Lakeview Family,

This Sunday, Lord willing, we will complete our series on the Nicene Creed. As we prepare for that, I would like to offer you some important reasons why it is prudent that we be conversant with this faithful and orthodox statement of the faith. As Charles Spurgeon once pointed out, "It seems odd, that certain men who talk so much of what the Holy Spirit reveals to themselves, should think so little of what he has revealed to others."

Spurgeon reminds us that the Holy Spirit is not an individual gift. He is a corporate gift to the body of Christ. That is, the Holy Spirit is a gift to the Church of all ages. The Holy Spirit has taught others in the past and the Holy Spirit uses these past believers to teach us. Church historian, Stephen Nichols, is insightful when he argues that it should strike us as bizarre that the church of the 21st century thinks so highly of what the Holy Spirit has taught the people of God today, yet thinks so little of what the Holy Spirit taught the church in the first century, the second, the third, the fourth, and so on.

As Deuteronomy 6:10-11 beautifully portrays for us, we drink at wells we did not dig, we eat from vineyards we did not plant, and we live in cities we did not build. So drinking from wells we did not dig, we receive great value from the Nicene Creed (along with the other historic creeds, the Athanasian Creed and the Apostles' Creed).

First, the Nicene Creed summarizes Christian truth. Unless you have memorized all 66 books of the canon and are able to instantly recall and systematize the verses together to form doctrine, then you depend on summaries of biblical truth that have a kind of "pregnant brevity" (J.I. Packer). For example, the phrase "Jesus Christ died on the cross to pay for sins" is a concise summary of verses like Matthew 20:28, John 3:16, John 10:11, Romans 5:8-10, 1 Corinthians 15:3, 2 Corinthians 5:14-15, etc. In other words, we do not recite every single verse when we are speaking of Christ's saving work; rather, we use a summary statement.

A second value is that the Nicene Creed testifies to what the Church has always believed. Indeed, it connects us to the faith of our father. We have a blood-bought relationship with those who have gone before us in the faith. In referring to the theological consensus of Christian scholars worldwide, Lewis Ayres notes that the Nicene Creed is "the most important creed in the history of Christianity (Nicaea and its Legacy, pg. 1). Justin Holcomb asserts, "It settled the question of how Christians can worship one God and also claim that this God is three persons" (*Know the Creeds and Councils*, pg. 33). That is why the Nicene Creed has the honor of being the first creed to obtain universal acceptance in Christ's Church. In this regard, Timothy George is helpful in distinguishing "the faith," or the faith once for all delivered to the saints (Jude 3). This is the Word of God. Then there is "my faith." It is my personal response to "the faith." Finally, there is the "Church's faith." The Nicene Creed is an expression of that.

A third benefit of the Nicene Creed is that it creates a protective barrier for reading the Bible. That is, it helps keep the reader from projecting a God of his/her own making. We know from Israel's own history that left to our own devices, we tend to project a God of our own making. As God says to Israel, "You thought that I was one like yourself" (Psalm 50:21). So creeds are guardrails keeping us from veering off into idolatry.

(Pastor's Pen continued) Conversely, a fourth reason why the Nicene Creed is necessary is that it corrects error. The reality of truth presupposes the existence of error. There is no error that presents a greater danger to Christ's Church than theological error. Heresy, which is the denial of a doctrine central to the Christianity, has eternal consequences.

A fifth value of the Nicene Creed is that it aids us in being precise in how we express truth. By connecting us to our ancestors in the faith, there is a sense of sanctified confidence that when we speak the language of the Creed, vetted for 1700 years, we are on sure footing.

Sixth and finally, the Nicene Creed clarifies the doctrines "of first importance" (1 Corinthians 15:3). Of course, the Nicene Creed is a creedal floor, not a creedal ceiling. That is, every believer will believe more than what the creed says but not less. This creedal floor that we know as the Nicene Creed conveys what the Church historically sees as the foundational truths of the faith. Believers can disagree on issues and still "maintain the unity of the Spirit in the bond of peace" (Ephesians 4:3) as "one body" (Ephesians 4:4). But the Nicene Creed ably communicates our "one faith" (Ephesians 4:5).

That said, please pray for me as I plan to complete what will be a six part series on the Nicene Creed.

REQUIREMENTS FOR DEACONS-IN-SERVICE

Every fall, Lakeview members are encouraged to submit names for deacon service. Names may be submitted to any current deacon, any pastor or turned in at the office. Please see below for deacon requirements and the deadline to submit names.

- 1. Confess to be a born-again Christian with a personal knowledge of Jesus as Lord and Savior and living a life controlled by the Holy Spirit.
- 2. Read and accept the Scriptural basis for deacons as prescribed in 1 Timothy 3:8-12 and Acts 6:1-7.
- 3. Support by faith and action the Lakeview Baptist Church Covenant, the Baptist Faith and Message (2000), the Chicago Statement on Biblical Inerrancy, the Danvers Statement, the Manhattan Declaration and the Nashville Statement.
- 4. Be age 25 or older, and if married, the husband of one wife (never divorced).
- 5. Give at least a tithe of your income to the budget of Lakeview Baptist Church.
- 6. Support by prayer and participation the entire church ministry, particularly Sunday School, Sunday Worship services, mid-week services, and other ministries of God's work insofar as able in good faith and conscience.
- 7. Seeking to fulfill the Scriptural mandate to be "above reproach," the deacon will abstain from the use of pornography, intoxicating beverages, tobacco and gambling.
- 8. Assume without reservation the responsibilities, obligations, and opportunities expected of a deacon-in-service. Deacons are servants who lead and leaders who serve. The deacons shall join the pastor in providing spiritual oversight of the church. Together with the pastor, they shall seek to know the will of God for the church and lead the congregation to do God's will. In this, the Statement of Purpose adopted by the church will be their guide. Deacons shall meet with the pastor and the pastoral staff on a regular basis to engage in Bible study, prayer, fellowship and to deal with matters pertaining to the responsibilities of the deacons.
- 9. For nomination as a deacon-in-service, nominees shall have been a member of Lakeview Baptist Church for at least one year prior to their service.

DEACON NOMINATION PROCEDURE

- **A.** Any church member may make recommendations to the Deacon Nomination Committee. Submit recommendations in writing prior to September 30th. The Deacon Nomination Committee will select the nominees from the church membership.
- **B.** The Deacon Nomination Committee shall be composed of the pastor, the Chairman of deacons, the vice-chairman of deacons, and a fourth member selected by the Chairman of deacons from the deacons-in-service.
- **C.** The Deacon Nomination Committee will uniformly examine the qualifications of individuals recommended for deacon-in-service against the above stated standards and will present a list of nominees for election.
- **D.** Generally, nominations will include two individuals for each vacant position, either for a regular rotation vacancy, or for an unexpired term. The Deacon Nomination Committee will make final determination on the number of nominees based on the number of qualified candidates available.

Please submit recommendations of men for consideration in writing to the church office, or to the Chairman of Deacons. Submit recommendations in a sealed envelope with "Deacon Recommendation" written on the outside of the envelope. Recommendations to the Deacon Nomination Committee will be confidential.
