Dear Lakeview Family,

We just completed our time in Genesis on Sunday nights and beginning this Sunday, we begin our trek through the book of Ecclesiastes. Ecclesiastes has 12 chapters, 222 verses and its implied purpose is twofold: (1) to make us sense the futility of a life lived only by earthly values; and (2) to lead us, to use Charles Simeon's words, "to enjoy God in everything and everything in God."

There are wide differences regarding the main point of the book. Jerome wrote a commentary on Ecclesiastes partly to persuade a woman from Rome named Blessila that she should choose a life of monasticism. He argued that the book was "to show the utter vanity of every sublunary (belonging to this world) enjoyment, and hence the necessity of betaking oneself to an ascetic life, devoted entirely to the service of God." Others have asserted that the main purpose is that worldly pleasures are the highest good: eat, drink, and be merry! Conversely, others have made the case that the main point is fatalism.

I will make the case that the central burden of the book is the problem of our fallen attempt to find meaning in creation apart from our Creator/Redeemer. Nothing in creation can give meaning, purpose, and joy when we separate it and elevate it above the Creator.

Despite its relative brevity, the book covers virtually every aspect of life you can think of: work, leisure, entertainment, time, worship, nature, money, death, sleep, eating, drinking, sex, farming, commerce, education, and government.

The most important phrase in the book is "under the sun" (or variants such as under heaven), which occurs 28 times in 12 chapters. The phrase denotes life lived by purely earthly, temporal values without regard to spiritual and heavenly values.

Another key to the book is the word translated "vanity" or "meaningless," which appears some 38 times. The word suggests fleetingness and emptiness of life without God at the center.

One more phrase that is seen in Ecclesiastes is "chasing after the wind" found nine times, and by its very words, it speaks to the futility of enjoying creation apart from the Creator.

One point that I want to bring out throughout this study is that God's goodness is really present in his gifts, and because of that, we are free to enjoy them for his sake. These created gifts "become avenues for enjoying him, beams of glory that we chase back to the source" (Joe Rigney, *Strangely Bright*, 48).

The most compelling division of the book is as follows (per John Currid's Commentary):

- 1) 1:1-11 – The Problem. What is the purpose and meaning of a fleeting life?
- 2) 1:12-3:13 – The Quest. Here Solomon goes on a journey to find the meaning of life.
- 3) 3:14-7:29 – Objections. These objections are raised against the sovereignty of God.
- 4) 8:1-11:10 – Practical Advice. Solomon provides counsel on how to live life based on divine sovereignty.
- 5) 12:1-14 – Conclusion. Solomon argues that meaning is found in God alone.

I hope this helps. Please pray for me as I prepare.
